Who are the referrers of social prescribing?

A range of organisations can refer a person for social prescribing, including but not limited to:

- · General Practitioners
- Pharmacies
- Multi-disciplinary teams
- Hospital discharge teams
- · Fire service
- Police
- Job centres
- Social care services
- Housing associations
- Voluntary, community and social enterprise (VCSE)
- A person can also self-refer.



Who are the beneficiaries of Social Prescribing?

Social Prescribing benefits a whole range of people including but not limited to, people:

- · with one or more long term conditions.
- who require mental health support.
- who are lonely or isolated.
- who have complex social needs which affect their well-being.

Voluntary sector groups are a vital part of our society as they can offer so many different and bespoke services to a community. There are many ways in which a community group can support a person with their health and wellbeing


- providing counselling, advice and support
